Houston, Texas, September 9, 1911

Dear Sir: Replying to your personal favor of September 7th, I beg to advise that there can be no objection to Dr. Washington engaging drawing-room over our lines from New Orleans to Maricopa. This is an interstate journey and the state laws would not apply. I would suggest that Dr. Washington purchase through ticket, which would include passage from New Orleans to Maricopa direct.
