To Nathan B. Young

[Tuskegee, Ala., Mar. 5, 1895]

Mr. Young: Hereafter Porter Hall, including the steps, halls and recitation rooms is to be scrubbed every other day, and the chapel twice a week. The unfrosted windows are to be cleaned every week. The paint is to be carefully wiped off or washed once a week, especially the paint on the doors around the knobs.

Mr. Calloway will explain the details of this work to you if you will see him. This same thing applies to the recitation rooms in Armstrong Hall and Slab Hall.
