VOLUME 6, p. 242, add annotation: William Monroe Trotter (1872–1934) was BTW's most vehement and uncompromising black critic. A *magna cum laude* graduate of Harvard, he spoke for the elite black professional class through the Boston *Guardian*, a weekly newspaper he founded in 1901. His chief interests were civil rights and criticism of the conservative leadership of BTW. In July 1903 Trotter achieved the confrontation he had long sought with BTW in what became known as the Boston Riot. For his part in this disruption of Washington's speech he served a thirty-day jail sentence. Soon afterward, Trotter founded the New England Suffrage League, and in 1905 he aided W. E. B. Du Bois in founding the Niagara Movement. Distrusting the white founders of the NAACP, he withdrew from the organization at its formative stage. A supporter of Woodrow Wilson in 1912 in protest against the part of Roosevelt and Taft in the Brownsville affray, he soon quarreled with Wilson over the issue of federal segregation measures. Trotter's career was punctuated by irreparable breaks with his co-workers, and during his last decade he was increasingly isolated from the mainstream of black affairs. See Fox, *Guardian of Boston*.
